The application form will be accessed via a link through email, parents will receive this on the 18th March. Applications need to be returned by Tuesday 23rd March.

Guided Subjects

Students have a wide range of Guided subjects to choose from to complement the core subjects, to allow students to follow subjects they are most interested in and enjoy. Some of the subjects are GCSE subjects and some are vocational subjects. All staff will provide thorough advice and guidance to ensure that students are comfortable with their two year journey which will lead to academic success. GCSE subjects are typically examination based subjects at the end of Year 11. BTEC and Vocational subjects are mainly coursework based subjects, where assignments are completed throughout the course. There is also an exam element in the coursework subjects.

Guided Subjects – How do I select appropriate subjects?

Subjects studied should be wide ranging and balanced. Current employment trends would advise young people to not singularly qualify for the job they want, but to qualify for as many jobs as they can.


To ensure a balanced selection, students should look carefully at the information about the courses on offer, taking particular notice of the demands of each course. Whilst there is flexibility within the Guided Subject offer we will ensure students follow appropriate pathways which will enable them to have a good progression route for the next stage of their life at Brixham College and beyond.

Students have engaged in the 'Explore and Research' booklet which they have hopefully shared with you. Students have been asked to explore and research careers, education, training and employment. It is important students reflect on their 'Personal profile' and future aspirations as part of determining their Guided Subject preferences.

Students have been encouraged to ask as many questions as possible in preparation for this decision.

Supporting the students with decision making

It is important we all play our part in supporting the child with making appropriate decisions. It is quite normal at this stage for young people not be 100% sure of what they want to study or what they want to be in the future. It is therefore really important to listen to those around you as well to inform decision making.




This is an important stage of the process, understanding what the students is good at, interested in are important factors when narrowing down subjects you want to continue in, or explore.

Understanding the requirements of each course will be very important in enabling you to make informed decisions. Please see the 'Guided Subject overview' booklet to glean further information on courses.


Pathways to Success

The below gives a very broad indication of the kind of pathway a student may follow. Inevitably, through the application process students will have a blend of pathways, but may lean towards a course preference. This will be very much based on their individual strengths and interests, following advice and guidance.

The pathways provide some indication of potential Post 16 pathways. Again, these are very broad indications of potential progression routes. It must be stressed that no one pathway is better than another. It is important when coming to a decision on Guided Subjects that a broad and balanced approach is taken, and a mixture of GCSE and Vocational subjects can be appropriate for many.



The English Baccalaureate



The EBacc (English Baccalaureate) is an award which supports students to study a broad and balanced curriculum involving specific GCSEs that are recognised by top Universities as qualifications which hold high academic status. **Whilst we do not prescribe specific pathways for students to follow, many students may want to study EBacc subjects.** In order to achieve the award, students will need to gain a grade 5-9 in the following:

- English, Maths and Science (Science can Include Computer Science)
- History OR Geography
- French OR Spanish

It is strongly recommended that students with aspiration for A Level and University pathways follow the English Baccalaureate. It is also worth considering for all students who have demonstrated the aptitude to achieve grade 5 in all of these subject areas.

Guided Subject Blocks

We have distributed Guided Subjects into 4 blocks to provide a broad and balanced curriculum offer for all of our learners. Students will be asked to select **One preference** from **each block**.

Frequently asked questions

Why is it necessary to choose subjects?

There are so many subjects that are available to you during secondary education that it is not possible for you to study them all. You will need to select, with the help of your parents and teachers. Those subjects that are most appropriate for your interests, ambition and ability.

Why do students only have 4 choices?

Some subjects are classed as Core which means that it is a statutory requirement to study them up to GCSE level. Schools are also encouraged to ensure many students take another subject from the English Baccalaureate to ensure a broad and balanced curriculum.

Does this mean that Guided Subjects which are not the EBacc are less important?

Absolutely not. We value all subjects as highly as each other and are particularly proud of our high achieving practical subjects. Students are strongly recommended to use their Guided subject choices to pursue their interests and subjects they are most passionate about. Students should also be encouraged to follow new subjects which are interest to them, following their research and reflection o their skills and qualities.

Coursework Qualifications (BTEC or Vocational Qualifications)

BTECs and Vocational qualifications are alternative qualifications to GCSE that are equally as challenging but offer a different approach to learning. The final qualification (If passed at Level 2) is equivalent to a pass at GCSE. BTECs and Vocational Qualifications are available in Animal Care, Sport, Travel and Tourism, Health and Social Care, Music and 3D Design.

What are the grading systems at GCSE and BTEC??

In 2017, the new GCSE grade system was introduced, with papers graded from 9-1 rather than A*-G. The new numerical grades apply to all GCSE subjects. There is no exact equivalence between the old and new grades. However, grades 7 and above are roughly equivalent to the old grades A-A*, and grades 4-6 are roughly equivalent to the old grades C/B.

What is a good balance?

The curriculum on offer should provide you with a broad and balanced and relevant set of qualifications. It may be important to specialise in one or two subjects if you want to continue to study them after 16.

If you are uncertain at this stage, a good place to start is making sure that you chose subjects you already have a strong interest in.

Why do students only study 9 GCSEs?

As GCSEs have been reformed to be more challenging with more content and increase emphasis on terminal examinations, we believe 9 subjects is the appropriate balance for our students. This number would meet entry requirements for colleges, employers or Universities, some will stipulate specific grades for entry requirements.

What about students who struggle with GCSE or equivalents?

Appropriate considerations are made at Key Stage 4 with students who have had appropriate adjustments at Key Stage 3. We tailor the curriculum to meet the needs of our students and will speak with students and families where this is required or advised.

How do GCSE choices effect students going to 6th Form college and University?

Students will need at least grade 4 or above to be accepted into 6th Form and certain subjects will have other specific requirements where entrance grades are higher. How can students ensure they are matching their GCSEs to aspirations?

Students should do as much research and take as much advice as they can. We have excellent Careers Advice within the school and students and parents can contact Mrs L Aston to make an appointment. laston@brixhamcollege.co.uk

What if students know what they want to do when they leave school?

They don't need to worry about this. The guided subjects provide a firm foundation for further study so we recommend that students focus on choosing the subjects that they enjoy and do well at as that should ultimately lead to success.

What to avoid

- **Don't** choose a subject because your friend has chosen it – you may be placed in different groups.
- **Don't** choose a subject because of a teacher – you may have a different teacher.
- **Don't** choose a subject because you think they are an easy option – there aren't any easy subjects, they all require the same amount of work and effort in different ways.



Can a student change their mind?

It may be possible to change your mind in the first two weeks of starting the course **but you should not expect this to be the case**. Changes would need to be agreed with Mr Squires within the first two weeks otherwise valuable teaching time is lost and you will struggle to catch up. **Changes can also only be made if there is a place available in the subject with the student is wishing to move to.**

Why is there reserve choices on the Guidance Form?

Despite our best efforts, we cannot offer infinite combinations of subjects. Sometimes student subject choices may be a popular selection within the year group, and therefore places can be limited. Students will be asked to provide reserve subjects, and conversations will take place where reserve subjects are required to secure the best pathway possible.

What Criteria are used to ensure this is fair?

- **Criteria 1:** The Guided Subject Form was submitted by the deadline
- **Criteria 2:** Ensure students have selected appropriate subjects, taking in to account: Progress, Attitude to learning, enrichment, strengths and interests, future aspirations.
- **Criteria 3:** Fairness in achieving first place subjects, whereby possible for all students (Ultimately, this is difficult to achieve across the board and is very dependent on student selection)

Please note some courses may be withdrawn if there is insufficient demand.

Please note Guided Subject blocks can also be subject to change, depending on student interest.

With this thought in mind, we advise students to put as much thought into the reserve choices as what they do with their first 4 choices.

Final suggestions for students to consider when making their choices

- What do I enjoy studying? What are my strengths?
- What do I learn best and will the course suit me?
- If I choose this subject now, will it keep more options open for later for further study, training or work?

Some things for parents/ careers to consider with students:

- Some students may say they really like a subject but really they believe it is an easier option. All subjects are demanding and they will have to work hard to gain a qualification in any subject at GCSE level.
- Encourage the English Baccalaureate subjects where these are appropriate for the student.
- Check students aren't choosing because of friendship groups or teachers. Groups and teachers can not be guaranteed due to timetabling complexities.
- Use your experience to advice students on the positive that each subject could provide.
